Grade C3 (Based on YOG in Aspen)

In accordance with your Individual Education Program (IEP), you are enrolled in courses that will lead to you earning a special education certificate. Included in your graduation plan for a special education certificate is a course of study designed to support your postsecondary goals in the area of education or training, employment, and independent living.

The Summary of Performance (SOP), provided at least 60 days before graduation, outlines your strengths, needs, accommodations, and supports from high school. It includes recommendations for your future and is a valuable tool when applying for jobs, further education, or services, helping others understand your needs and how to support your success beyond graduation.

College Action Steps

River Terrace Education Campus: Workforce Development Center provides DCPS adult students (18-22) with intellectual and developmental disabilities specialized training in the areas of Health Services, Horticulture, or Hospitality. Speak with your case manager about applying for the program.

Supported decision-making is when a student over the age of 18 years retains their rights as the ultimate decision-maker but consents to let parents continue to be involved. More information about supported decision making can be found at this link:
