- Extracurricular activities, internships, jobs, and family responsibilities give colleges a full picture of who you are.

CHALLENGE YOUR SELF ACADEMICALLY

- The most important admissions factor colleges consider is your academic profile, which includes your GPA, and the challenging courses you are taking throughout high school.
- Your GPA also helps determine which colleges are Smart Colleges for you.
- List all the rigorous courses you took while high school school on your college applications! (For example -Honors, Advance Placement, IB, Dual Enrollment and/or Dual Credit).


PREPARE FOR SAT

- Test Scores from the SAT or ACT are used by some colleges to assess your academic preparedness for college. DCPS offers the SAT to seniors, FREE of charge, at their home school during the fall (October 13).
- Test Scores may be used for scholarship and merit aid consideration. Do your research!
- Practice! Studying for the SAT for 20 hours using Khan Academy can lead to a 115-point average score increase.

- Some colleges may not require test scores for admissions, this means they are Test Optional. To view a list of Test Optional schools visit https://www.fairtest.org/university/optional



HOW DOES YOUR GPA COMPARE?



4.50 Highly Selective: Colleges and Universities that admit less than 30% of their applicants can be considered highly selective. These schools have competitive application processes and tend to 4.00 look for strong characteristics across academics, extracurriculars, writing, and fit. 3.50 Selective: Any school that does not accept all their applicants are considered Your GPA selective colleges. These 300 of 3.11 schools may admit most of their applicants but require that students meet their admissions standards, which can include GPA minimums, course requirements, and testing. Colleges with open admissions accept all students provided they have a high school diploma or GED, regardless of GPA and/ or standardized test scores. These schools span all types and regions.

Fall (September- November)

Graduation Action Steps (All Students/ All Pathways) Meet with Counselor to discuss graduation progress, verify schedule is correct and sign Letter of Understanding (LOU). Create a plan to complete community service hours inclusive of winter and spring break options, if needed.
