's Roadmap for College and Beyond

The college application process begins in early Fall.

Use this roadmap to stay on track toward college success!

College Entrance Exams

Test scores from the <u>SAT</u> or <u>ACT</u> are used by some colleges to assess your academic preparedness for college. Even at test-optional colleges, scores may be used for scholarship and merit aid consideration. Do your research! Some colleges will accept your superscore, the combination of your highest scores from each test section. Testing multiple times allows you to achieve a higher superscore.

- Participate in the free <u>DCPS SAT Fall School day</u> & if you choose, take an SAT or ACT weekend exam. Ask your counselor about an SAT weekend fee waiver.
- Determine what colleges on your list require testing.
- For test-optional colleges, determine if your scores will support your application.
- Submit your official test scores to your colleges.

Applying Successfully

Colleges have early application deadlines in the fall, and meeting these deadlines can boost your chances of admission and securing scholarships.

- ☐ Apply to at least 2 Smart Colleges.
- Complete application via the Common App, Common Black Application, Coalition for College, or direct to the college.
- ☐ Request transcripts and recommendation letters through Naviance.
- Finalize college essay by having it edited by a trusted adult.
- ☐ Check email often for missing application materials.
- Write an activities list that showcases your accomplishments and leadership.

You can do it!

College Success

DCPS is committed to ensuring that students who enroll in college graduate & achieve successful careers. DCPS Persists is an alumni program that provides DCPS students with a support network to succeed in college.

- Register for <u>DCPS Persists</u>, attend orientation and attend Summit & Send-Off event.
- Request final Transcript through Naviance.
- Know amount and due date of first bill.
- Work with the college's Registrar or Transfer Credit
 Office to ensure your credits from dual enrollment, AP and IB courses are accepted.
- Check your personal and college email regularly.
- Familiarize yourself with campus resources, activities, and career support.

Exploring Colleges

Smart Colleges are institutions from which you have a higher likelihood of graduating based on your academic profile. You will be recommended to consider certain colleges.

The stronger your GPA and test score, the more selective universities you should be applying to.

- Meet with your counselor and/or college and career coordinator to identify your Smart College target.
- ☐ Use Naviance and BigFuture to research colleges.
- ☐ Visit colleges by going to campus tours, fly-ins, and open
- Finalize your college list. It should include a mix of likely, match, and reach colleges & universities.

Paying for College

Each student's cost of attendance will differ; you will not know your cost of attendance until you submit your financial aid applications. As a family, discuss whether and how much your family can contribute toward the cost of college.

Complete financial aid applications early! The FAFSA is scheduled to open December 1. It will require input from both students and families.

- ☐ Explore colleges that meet 100% financial need.
- ☐ If eligible, submit the <u>FAFSA</u> and the <u>CSS Profile</u>.
- Complete <u>Net Price Calculators</u> to estimate what your family may be expected to pay toward tuition.
- ☐ If qualified, apply for DC grants and scholarships like DCTAG and Mayor's Scholars.
- Apply for scholarships starting now! Sign up for the <u>DCPS</u> Dollars4College Scholarship and Financial Aid Newsletter.

College Decisions & Enrollment

After being admitted to colleges, you will receive a financial aid award letter from each school, upon successful submission of FAFSA and if applicable, the CSS profile. Compare the financial aid packages offered, then make the best financial, academic & social choice.

- Compare financial aid award letters. Use a <u>cost comparison tool</u> and your school's counselor or college and career counselor for support.
- By May 1, accept your admissions offer & pay your deposit; some colleges may offer fee waivers if needed. Choose a college based on the best financial, academic, and social match.
- ☐ Ensure you submit required college documents including housing applications, health forms, and orientation registration.



What determines whether a school is a likely, match, or reach? It is largely determined by your GPA. Based on your academic profile a school may be considered in one of the three categories:

Likely: Colleges that you are very likely to be accepted to based on your academic profile and/or the acceptance rate of the college. Students should always have a few of these schools on their college list. Students should apply to likely colleges that they would attend if accepted, meaning they should still consider cost, location, and fit.

Match: Colleges that you are likely to get into based on your academic profile. A college is considered a match if your GPA and/or test scores fall between the 25th-75th percentile of students enrolled at the college. This means that you fall into the middle of students who are accepted into that specific college and/or university.


Reach: Colleges that are highly selective, or that you are less likely to get accepted to based on your academic profile and/or the acceptance rate of the college. Generally, a college is considered a reach if your GPA and/or test score fall below the 25th percentile of students enrolled at the college.

Next Steps by Postsecondary Pathway

Your postsecondary pathway will determine your next steps! Review the steps below with your family, counselor, and CCC to create your individual plan for postsecondary success.

Graduation Action Steps Meet with Counselor to discuss graduation progress, verify schedule, and sign Letter of Understanding. Create a plan to complete community service hours, inclusive of winter and spring break options, if needed.

Enroll in academic recovery options as necessary to remain on track for graduation.

Complete all graduation obligations, including submitting community service forms and completing the Senior Exit Survey in Naviance.

Register for the selective services (males only) within 30 days of 18th birthday.

Military Pathway Explore all branches of the military.

Take ASVAB exam at your school (if offered) or local recruitment office. Aim to achieve AFQT score of at least a 31.

Meet with military recruiter and submit required documents along with ASVAB scores. Pass physical fitness evaluation at Military Entrance Processing Station.



Direct Employment Pathway Identify industry in which you are interested in pursuing a job. Explore employment opportunities by industry: https://dcpscareerready.org/search/.
